Assess all programs, projects, and budget formulation through an equity lens




CLUSTER AGENCIES

protects the health, safety, economic interests, and quality of life of residents, businesses, and visitors in the District of Columbia by licensing and regulating businesses and investigating and enforcing the Consumer Protection Procedures Act.
